Chapter 1

The list goes on but those are the basic things that you may buy that could cause the store or check-out person to suspect you of drug manufacturing if you buy any of the above in a quantity

that they would consider unusual. If you stock up on batteries, if you lay in a supply of items for camping or if you are a prepper, you will draw the attention of the store and maybe the FBI, DHS, DEA, TSA, ATF or any number of local agencies if some zealot at the store fancies themselves as being able to spot terrorists for the government and fills out a SAR and gets you on a government watch list. So you just may be a terrorist.

Home Activities

If you do home improvements, grow a garden, can food, or just stockpile food for when the economy finally tanks, you might just be a terrorist.

All those common things can draw unwanted attention to you and your family and get you on any number of watch lists.

Chapter 3

Terrorists on Vacation

With the uncontrolled growth of government and the military industrial complex even something as simple as going on vacation with the family in a RV, can get you into trouble. TSA has recently expanded to Train and Bus Stations, and random stops on the highways.

Many of the items you could purchase for a vacation can and will draw unwanted attention as mentioned in previous chapters.

Not only can the stocking up on supplies, including food, attract

attention, but the very activities or things you do on vacation can get you in trouble.

The traveler away from home is particularly vulnerable to the authorities and can get into much more trouble when far from their support such as family, attorneys and friends in the community.

All authorities are on the alert for suspicious activity or behavior and any member of one's family, even children are under suspicion.

National parks and tourist attractions are considered prime targets for terrorists and security at such sites is heightened and common practices that used to be a fun part of a touring vacation can now turn it into a nightmare.

Here's a list of things that can attract attention and cause you serious problems. Any one of the things listed below can at best get your vehicle torn apart and/or impounded leaving you and your family standing on the roadside in the middle of nowhere.

If you are not known by the local store owners or clerks that can be considered suspicious behavior.

If you pay with cash, that can be considered suspicious behavior.

If you are asked for identification by a clerk and refuse, that can be considered suspicious behavior.

If you have fuel cans that you fill up, that can be considered suspicious behavior.

If you take a lot of pictures, that can be considered suspicious behavior.

If you mark your route on a map, that can be considered suspicious behavior.

If you mark landmarks, attractions or any destinations on a map, that can be considered suspicious behavior.

If you ask too many question about anything on federal land, such as MT. Rushmore, the Statue of Liberty, etc., that can be considered suspicious behavior.

If you wait around outside a store or public building for family members, that can be considered suspicious behavior.

If you change your appearance, such as shave off a beard or get a haircut, that can be considered suspicious behavior.

If you have any fingers missing, that can be considered suspicious behavior.

If you have any burns from the campfire, that can be considered suspicious behavior.

Those are just the most obvious things but one must remember that what is considered suspicious behavior to one person is normal to another.

Once you have eliminated all those

from your carry on you still must pass muster on the TSA's no fly list. That has more than a million names and if you name, or someone with a very similar name is on it, you won't be flying. TSA denies their list is that big but can they be trusted to divulge classified information to the general public? I think not.

Now you've passed the list you get to go through the screening. You have two choices here, get irradiated by their powerful x-ray machine or get a body search that can include a cavity search if you show too much annoyance at your rights to privacy being violated or being searched without probable cause.

Any arguing or complaints about rifling through your belongings and taking things are considered suspicious

behavior and could end up with trumped-up criminal charges and the confiscation of all your belongings.

Here are a few more things not to do at the airport unless you want to be apprehended as a terrorist.

Don't look around a lot even if this is your first time at the airport and find it fascinating.

Don't try to pay for a ticket with cash.

Don't stay in one spot waiting for your flight, loitering is a terrorist activity.

- Nearly any surplus items bought in

quantity will also raise a flag.

Government agencies take particular notice of surplus stores since you can theoretically outfit an army with everything you need with the exception of guns. So any purchase you make of say 20 pairs of wool socks may result in a report being filed. The government has basically decided they would prefer to know everything everybody buys.

Any items that detect electronic surveillance will raise a flag.

Any electronic surveillance devices will raise a flag if bought in quantity.

Any spy/espionage devices of any sort will raise a flag.

Buying a Geiger counter will raise a flag.

Buying an electromagnetic radiation

detector will raise a flag.

Buying any high-powered optical device will raise a flag.

Any gamma, alpha, beta or x-ray dose meters will raise a flag.

Buying any survivalist literature will raise a flag.

Buying any military manuals will raise a flag.

Buying any books that can be deemed anti-government will raise a flag.

Buying this book will raise a flag.

Chapter 6

Internet Terrorist

The internet is a wonderful source of

information but also a place where everything you do online can be tracked.

In recent days it has surfaced that the government intercepts EVERY email. Just surfing for certain materials can get you on a watch list as a potential terrorist.

If you read any anti-government info on the internet, you may be a terrorist.

If you download any books that are anti-government on the internet, you may be a terrorist.

If you visit any anti-government websites on the internet, you may be a terrorist.

If you use an anonymizer or any means to shield your IP on the internet, you may be a terrorist.

If you send encoded messages because you know the government is reading everything on the internet, you may be a terrorist.

If you use VOIP, such as Skype or communicate in a game using it on the internet, you may be a terrorist.

If you read news about terrorist attacks on the internet, you may be a terrorist.

If you read alternative news on the internet, you may be a terrorist.

If you download content of extreme/radical nature with violent themes, such as horror stories on the internet, you may be a terrorist.

If you purchase any of the items mentioned in previous chapters on the internet, you may be a terrorist.

If you download any terrorist or

revolutionary content, such as the history of the American Revolution on the internet, you may be a terrorist.

If you read any content about defensive tactics, such as self-defense, on the internet, you may be a terrorist.

If you read any information about the police or the government on the internet, you may be a terrorist.

If you research any military tactics, equipment manuals or weapons information on the internet, you may be a terrorist.

If you gather any information about transportation routes, such as Google maps to find directions on the internet, you may be a terrorist.

If you download any photos maps or diagrams of sporting venues, such as finding out where your seats are for the

big game on the internet, you may be a terrorist.

For the individual it is even worse, any statements made in public that criticize the government or a government official can get you on the huge list of people on the FBI terrorist watch list. You can also land on the list if your are reported for taking notes, drawing, writing on a map or taking

photos. Asking questions can also get you on the list.

You can end up on the list if you appear to be lost.

You can end up on the list if you forget a bag or package.

You can end up on the list if you illegally park.

You can end up on the list if you talk to someone who is on the list.

You can end up on the list if you question any professional in a way that causes them to feel you are too inquisitive.

You can end up on the list if you or a family member or friend is on the list.

You can end up on the list if you were not born in the United States.

You can end up on the list if you are absent doing charity work.

You can end up on the list if you attend a religious school.

You can end up on the list if you believe in any conspiracy theories.

You can end up on the list if you believe that the US provokes terrorism.

You can end up on the list if you own any personal protective equipment such as a respirator or safety goggles.

You can end up on the list if you stockpile food.

You can end up on the list if you buy gold or silver.

You can end up on the list if you subscribe to newsletters from websites that criticize the government.

You can end up on the list if you criticize government contractors.

You can end up on the list if you criticize any government policy.

Part Two

Forward

Protecting Your Rights

Some of us believe that no law that removes or limits our rights as citizens of the United States of America can be legal and must sooner or later be repealed or ruled unconstitutional by the Supreme Court.

In the meantime we must do all we can to hold onto our rights to privacy and private property that are guaranteed under the Constitution and the Bill of Rights.

By the very act of insuring our rights

we may attract the attention of some federal agency but at least we will have the satisfaction of knowing that attention was drawn to us not by some simple purchase or by photographing a landmark, but by a deliberate effort by us to maintain our rights and freedoms. Unfortunately in this climate of fear mongering and endless war for the profit of banks and corporation the very act of trying to keep your privacy and rights is seen as potential terrorist activity.

Chapter 1

Electronic Protection

The biggest area where our rights to privacy are being violated is in electronic data. Police regularly scan cell phones for all the information they hold. Windows operating system can be remotely accessed by both Microsoft and the government. Stores regularly ask for personal information when you make a cash purchase. Wireless Networks can be easily accessed. Some companies are now asking for your Facebook password on job applications. All these things are violations of your rights to privacy.

I will try to address each of these problems and offer solutions that may, in the eyes of the government, make you a potential terrorist.

One of the first things I would suggest is to set up your own tracking system so you know where your vehicles and family members are located. There are many companies that provide GPS tracker systems for pets and kids that work on your computer. The longitudes and latitudes can be entered into Google and the exact location can be seen using Google earth. This will allow you to know where a missing family member is or at least the location of the tracker.

If a family member is apprehended by the authorities and not allowed to make contact the tracker will be at

whatever location they are being held. Even if deactivated the device will have provided the last location where it was active.

Next be sure that every opportunity to use a password on electronics is utilized. Any time something can be password protected it adds a level of security for your personal data. Whether a laptop, home computer, PDA, or Cell phone utilize the password capabilities. If you have a wireless network that too needs to be password protected.

Be sure to go into your laptop or personal computer and disable the remote access service. That way your computer is protect from easy access by outsiders. If you need to use that function to service your computer turn

it on when needed and turn it off when done.

Disable automatic updates from Microsoft. Time and again Microsoft will try to add security updates that will change your computer settings and authorize them to gather information from your computer. Manually check for updates and carefully read what each one does before you install it. The same goes for any updates to your computer. Set all software to check for updates but to not install them and to give you an alert if upgrades are available.

You should also check regularly for any malware that has installed itself on your computer and tracking cookies or flash cookies that have been installed.

Be sure your firewall is working

properly and have a good security software package, such as Norton installed and up to date.

All the above will help prevent unknown elements from searching through your stored electronic data. But what about Communications?

Carnivore and Eschelon

The US government has a software program called Carnivore that was developed to scan all electronic communications for keywords that may be related to terrorist or criminal activity.

Eschelon is the secret government agency that has facilities set up to do the monitoring of communications once keywords have been flagged by Carnivore.

Obvious words such as bomb, explosives and such are flagged, but many words, such as the names of certain countries or weather phenomenon will also raise a flag.

Below is a extensive but by no

means complete list of keywords that when used will get you electronic communications monitored.

That, I am sure, is just a partial list since the government surely is adding new words or phrases every day.

If you use or have used any of the above listed words in any electronic communique of any form you could be having all your communications monitored.

You should try to encrypt all emails and watch what you say in them.

Chapter 2

The Phone

When talking on the phone. Any threats of any kind can draw down the authorities, even something as simple as, "I could have killed him," or "I wish she was dead," is enough to get attention.

If you say something like, "That movie about the earthquake was a bomb, I coulda shot Mike for making me sit through it and there was this kid from Somalia, I think, coughing the whole time, I hope I didn't catch the plague or some virus from him. I wanted to see Pirates of the Caribbean

instead. But he would have gone nuclear if I made an issue of it."

In that statement there are many words that would get flagged, earthquake, bomb, shot, Somalia, plague, virus, Pirates and nuclear. That's eight keywords in a single statement, do you think your phone is being monitored?

Wireless providers seem to be more than happy to reveal you confidential phone conversations and your location with the authorities without probable cause or warrants. Police departments now have devices that can scan your phone for all it's data if you come in proximity to it.

Any wireless communications are susceptible to electronic eavesdropping.

Unfortunately there is little you can do to prevent the sharing of your phone calls but there are a few things you can do to prevent them from tracking your location or scanning all your data.

The best thing to do is to buy prepaid phones at places like Walmart. Buy them with cash so there is no link to your identity and the phone. Activate it from a computer where you can remain anonymous or use an anonymoizer. That way even if they can track the phone they don't know who's it is. Doing this is frowned upon since this is the very thing drug dealers and terrorists do. But if you want to protect your rights to privacy you need to do this too. When the time on the phone runs out buy another and repeat the process.

To protect from illegal scans of your data on a phone you can keep it in a metal box and turned off when not in use. Whether at home, in your car or just walking about, find a neat little metal box the phone will just fit in that doesn't really increase the size too much. This will also interfere with the tracking of your location as the provider will not get any telemetry from the phone while turned off in a metal box.

When you buy prepaid phones many stores have instructed their clerks to get personal information for cash purchases. Just tell them that is private information they don't need to make a cash sale. This may raise a flag but you have a right to not divulge any personal info unless necessary and buying something in a store for cash is not one

of those times.

Chapter 3

Dealing with Intrusive Policies

If you apply for a job and they ask for your Facebook password, you can do one of two things. If you outright refuse on the grounds of privacy you have no chance of getting the job, know that. No matter how cordial or nice the person you talk to is, your application will be in the trash before you are out the door.

If you give it to them they will check it to see who you are on Facebook. The old adage forewarned is forearmed works well here. Knowing that a potential employer may ask for such

information set up a facebook page that basically has all the info you would give on a job application and your resume. Include any church or civic activities too, that always looks good. If you already have a facebook page just make a new one with a slight variation on your name, such as using a nickname as you first name or including a middle initial. Then when asked give that account and password.

Another thing that can attract undue attention is making purchases of quantities of materials or foods.

When making purchases for a function of some sort try to have a flyer or letter that explains what the event is and ask a store employee to help you gather the stuff. This will prevent suspicion. You may be hosting a large

convention that will be catered but have decided it will be cheaper to provide your own coffee. So you may need to buy a few dozen large cans of coffee and several packages of coffee filters. You may also want to create an intimate atmosphere with low lighting and candles on the tables. Well coffee, filters and candles are on the watch list. By confiding in an employee and enlisting their help they will know that you have a legitimate use for those items.

Always try to make such purchases at stores where you are known.

Try to avoid paying cash for such purchases.

There are many more issues where your rights are being eroded on a daily basis and it will continue until after the

economic collapse that is inevitable because of criminal financial practices by the Federal Reserve and the too- big-to-fail banking institutions. The best advice I can give is to stockpile food, get as many silver coins as you can and try to get away from any large population centers.

Try to become as self-sufficient as possible, get candles, buy a hibachi grill and bags of charcoal briquettes to cook with, make sure you have proper camping equipment to survive in your home with no heat. I could go on but that is for another book.
